May Day – time to put away the umbrellas for those April showers and welcome the blooming flowers of May. At the same time we celebrate the coming of spring, we also must recall the most Holy Week of the church year. We welcomed Vicar Jake's return from the sunny south to lead us through the week. The week began with Palm Sunday with the Sunday School children, choir and Council members processing into church waving the palm branches in recognition of Jesus's triumphant entry into Jerusalem. Thank you to our Music & Worship Committee, Faith Formation and the choir for our beautiful service. That service was followed by a brunch where great food and fellowship were enjoyed by all. Many thanks go out to all the wonderful cooks and the willing hands that insured success.

Unfortunately the joy of that Palm Sunday in ancient Jerusalem did not last and the journey to Calvary began. Maundy Thursday service incorporated the foot washing as Jesus had done for his disciples at the Last Supper. It is our reminder that we are to serve one another. Then came the pain and sadness of Good Friday, witnessing the crucifixion of our Savior on the cross, a time when it seemed that hope itself had died. A wonderful Good Friday ecumenical service at Unitarian Fellowship with participation of clergy from a number of valley churches including Vicar Jake was held. Zion held a worship service on Friday evening as well. Both services reminded us that the flicker of hope had not died with Jesus.

Then came Easter! What a great celebration. Not only were we reminded that the gift of eternal like had been given to us through the resurrection of Christ, but it was also praised through beautiful music provided by our choir and a brass quintet as well as our own organ with William Surtees at the keyboard. Surrounded by such great music and the beauty of the flowers decorating our sanctuary, we did indeed celebrate a Holy Easter.

May Day, however, has a darker meaning. It is often used to signal an alarm, of trouble coming and a need for help. This is the case with our Fellowship Hour. We can thank Colleen, Lynn, Karen & Elmer, Kandie K., Barb and Clint for all the delicious treats and the coffee we enjoy on Sunday mornings as well as the set-up and clean up. This is not achieved without hard work and cost. The present model is not sustainable without extra help on all fronts. Other options could be explored such as occasionally skipping a Sunday, doing only coffee and cookies, etc. Please give this some prayerful thought. Fellowship is important; where one or two our gathered in His name, He will be also. I believe He is present in our Fellowship Hall as well as our Sanctuary each Sunday.

We continue to move forward in our Affordable Housing Project. A meeting will be held with our consultant, Carrie Sanders, to determine what is feasible financially both for Zion itself and for the housing project. As developments occur, the information will be shared. Zion is a faith community which exits because our ancestors believed. As we "tiptoe through the tulips" of May, remember that we can be a positive force in the wider community and grow strong in our church community.

The Vicar's Views "The Easter Season"



On Easter Day, we celebrated the miraculous resurrection of Jesus. The open tomb signifies that Jesus has accomplished his mission and redeemed his people from slavery to sin.

In the ELCA Lutheran tradition, Easter is not just a single day, but a 50-day season celebrating the resurrection of Jesus Christ. It's a time to rejoice in the defeat of death and the hope of new life offered by Christ's sacrifice. Easter marks the end of Lent and the beginning of a new life in Christ through baptism and the sharing of the bread and wine of Easter. The Easter season concludes on the 50th day, the festival of Pentecost (June 8th)

The Council of Nicaea in A.D. 325 directed that for the Western Church, Easter would be celebrated the first Sunday after the first full moon after the spring equinox (the Eastern Orthodox churches follow a different schedule today). This keeps it in close to the celebration of the Jewish Passover.

As Lutherans, we believe that we are not only freed from sin, but we are also filled with grace. We are to be living witnesses of Christ's resurrection by letting the grace we have received shine out for all to see in how we live our lives.

May we, at Zion, not only welcome those who enter our doors but also reach out to the community by sharing our God given gifts and talents. Thank you for all the ways that you serve the needs of our neighborhood, city, nation and world through your gifts of time, talent and treasure.


