# **Stewardship Notes: Generosity Time**

The word "stewardship" has a broad meaning, and is used in many different ways:

- · In the environment -- for discussions about use of the air, of water, or soil,
- · In leadership and human resources discussions -- how we are being stewards of the lives that are put in our hands, utilizing each person's unique gifts...
- · In the church -- stewardship as it relates to giving and generosity.

Often the first thing that comes to mind when many people in the church hear the word "stewardship" is the Fall Pledge Campaign. Stewardship is not about what the Stewardship or Finance Committee does in August or September in preparation for the pledge campaign in November. It is not about financial statements that show the amount of donations needed to make the budget.

This fall, we will do our best to "unlearn" this concept of stewardship.

Do not be mistaken: raising money for the operation of the church is important, and the money we give or do not give will either enable or hinder ministry that Zion must be about and that the world around us desperately needs. Creating revenue for the church is important, but it is not the true purpose of stewardship. In fact, because the word "stewardship" is so strongly identified with an autumn fund-raising event, we are going to use the word "generosity" as a way to embrace a focus that is not so limited. Our focus in our fall Generosity Time is about each of us and our need to give.

In John 10:10, Jesus says "I came that they may have life and have it abundantly," referring to a spiritual and fulfilling existence beyond mere physical life. This "abundant life" is not just about quantity, but about a superior quality of life characterized by love, joy, peace, and other fruits of the Spirit. It's a life lived in a right relationship with God, others, and creation, experiencing the fullness of God's grace and blessings. In our Generosity Time we will learn much more about this. 


