A Message from the Zion Lutheran Council President:

August – the month when kids fear walking into a store and seeing those dreaded words – "BACK TO SCHOOL SALE". No more carefree days soaking up the sun or splashing in the pool. However, for the first time in thirteen years Zion's halls will be silent; no more childish energy or laughter. The Appleton Bilingual School is gone.

The departure of this long-time tenant leaves many questions and possibilities, which has led to our Affordable Housing Project, repurposing our facilities to create housing for those who are in need of an affordable place to live in our community. This is in keeping with our mission of "creating community through God's love and guidance". The Real Estate Committee has been formed to work with our consultants to reach out to developers, both large and small, with a RFP (Request for Proposal). It is a slow process since in the past we had considered several proposals which unfortunately did not work out. Please keep this committee in your prayers as we continue the search for a project which that is feasible and meets our needs. As matters develop and there is positive news to share, the congregation will be informed.

Likewise, the Call Committee, co-chaired by Deb Reis and Trisha Kasten, continues their search for a "Right Fit" pastor for Zion. Pastor Asher O'Callaghan has left his position as Assistant to the Bishop for Transition. It will be filled by Pastor Nathan Gauerke. Pastor Gauerke had served Zion for several years and hopefully will have a clear picture of our needs and will be helpful in finding the right individual. Again, as things develop, the congregation will be informed. Please keep Pastor Gauerke and the Call Committee in your prayers.

Although we face a number of uncertainties, Zion remains a worshiping and active congregation. We enjoyed fellowship at our annual picnic in June, used our Christmas in July celebration to leave gifts, both monetary and non-perishable foot items under the Christmas tree and look ahead to September with "God's Work, Our Hands". Our blessing box, faithfully filled by Tommy Meltz, is used daily and your donations go far in Jesus's commission to "Feed my sheep".

We also continue to serve meals to the Habitat for Humanity volunteers which is much appreciated by those who generously give their time for make homes affordable to families. Our meaningful worship is conducted with the involvement of two wonderful pastors, Karen Jewell and Jan LaVake, when Vicar Jake cannot be with us. We have enjoyed varied types of music over the summer, thanks to our Music Coordinator, Heather Watney. What we have not heard is the beauty of our bells. The reason for this is the bells have been sent for cleaning and refurbishing, something long overdue, thanks to the efforts of Paula Staedt and the Worship and Music Committee. This is an expensive process, costing over \$5,000.00. Anyone who wishes to donate to this endeavor can contact the church office or mark an envelope. We look forward to hearing those lovely tones again in the near future.



The Vicar's Views



How is your prayer life?

How we pray, or even whether we pray, says a lot about our relationship with God. So, when one of the disciples in Luke 11: 1-13 says to Jesus, "Teach us to pray," we can be pretty sure he is asking for more than simply words or techniques. There is a desire deep within him. He has seen Jesus praying. Perhaps he saw Mary sitting at the feet of Jesus, listening as we heard in last week's gospel. The disciple wants a relationship with Jesus like Mary did and what Jesus has with God the Father. That relationship is not about words or techniques.

Most of us were taught as a child to see prayer as a wish list given to God. This to-do list kind of prayer leaves us seeking something from God rather than seeking God. It seems that giving God our "to do list" of requests is the usual way that most people pray. I invite you to pray by giving up the to do list and just be with God.

Jesus is not simply teaching us new words or techniques, and certainly not another to-do list for God. He is, rather, giving us a new direction for our lives. He is calling us to a deeper prayer. It is a place of being with God rather than taking from God. It is a place where God himself is the answer to every prayer. This way of praying is less about the words we say.

So, our relationship with God and our relationship with neighbors, friends, family, and our enemies, mirrors each other. Prayer requires a relationship. That relationship means that our life, comes from God. Prayer reminds us that we are "not self-sufficient" but dependent on God.

Finally, perhaps the greatest difficulty with prayer is that sometimes we just want God to change our circumstances. While God sometimes does change circumstances, I am convinced that God, more often than not, changes us.

Let us pray, in the last days of this summer, may you enjoy time to relax and revel in God's creation and just be with God. May you experience the love and support that comes from a closer relationship with God. In the name of Jesus, Amen.
